

PROJECT LOOK SHARP

Project Look Sharp - in collaboration with AASL - is offering a new version of its well-received online course Empowering All Students Through Media Decoding. The course trains K-12 educators in Constructivist Media Decoding (CMD) – a student-centered, curriculum-driven, question-based methodology (with materials) for K-12 integration. This is the first time we've opened up this course for K-12 teachers as well as librarians.

The course will run March 4 - May 6, and includes 2 live online sessions with the creators of CMD, 4 interactive self-paced modules, and individual coaching as participants create their own media decoding activity and teach it with students.

- <u>Power Map:</u> Learn about 90+ elected officials, including their responsibilities, recent legislation or actions and who else in the local government they work with.
- <u>Civic Glossary:</u> Breaking down complicated civics terms with youthwritten definitions and examples.
- <u>Organization Directory:</u> Find dozens of NYC-based organizations that serve young New Yorkers.



New York Students Need Media Literacy Education Now

The <u>DemocracyReady NY Coalition</u> issued a new report calling on the New York State Education Department to advance *universal access to media literacy*

education for all New York students. The report presents a plan to help guide state education officials in taking immediate action to ensure New York does not continue to fall behind other states that have already taken steps to ensure their students become media literate.

In today's world, media literacy is a necessity and must be part of the pathway to a high school diploma. Young people engage with screen media for many hours each day, and media messages influence nearly every aspect of their lives. Media literacy encompasses the knowledge and skills





<u>Gauging Civic Readiness: The State of Civic Readiness in the United States and Recommendations for Its Improvement</u>

• Preparing young people for their civic responsibilities in a democracy is an essential role of schools in the United States. Yet, this report shows that over 80% of states currently ignore the need to assess the full extent to which students are being prepared for capable civic participation.
