PROJECT LOOK SHARP

Project Look Sharp has **147 free lessons** related to presidential campaigns. Each of our media decoding lessons are question-based, student-centered, curriculum-driven, and come with all the media (videos, slides, etc.), a lesson plan and handouts. Here are some of the lessons for the 2024 election:

- What is a Campaign? (elementary level). Students analyze historic and contemporary campaign media for messages about purpose, media types and democratic process.
- Harris vs Trump: Whose Language, Whose Issues? Students analyze webpage issue lists to identify which are from the Harris and which are from the Trump campaigns, reflecting on language choices, target audience, and their own biases.
- <u>Kamala Harris & Donald Trump Video Biographies</u> Students analyze Donald Trump and Kamala Harris film biographies for messages about presidential leadership, media creation, and how political bias shapes media interpretation.
- Messaging Masculinity in the 2024 Presidential Campaign Students analyze speeches and analysis from the 2024 Republican and Democratic conventions for messages about defining masculinity, political campaign messaging and identity as a factor in media interpretation.
- Satirizing Trump and Harris Comedy, Bias, and Impact Students explore political satire through the analysis of comedy sketches related to the 2024 presidential debate between Kamala Harris and Donald Trump.
- <u>The Immigration Debate: Trump vs Harris</u> Students analyze political ads from the 2024 presidential campaign for messages about immigration, media construction, and our own interpretations.
- To Break the Glass Ceiling: Analyzing Campaign Ads by Women Running for President Students analyze political campaign ads for messages about female presidential candidates, historical and cultural context, and techniques of persuasion.

• Good Data - Bad Feelings: Graphing Economics, Public Opinion and Media Coverage (Math) Students analyze graphs and media analysis for messages about the relationship between media reporting on the economy and public opinion.

As part of U.S. Media Literacy Week 2024, the <u>DemocracyReady NY</u> <u>Coalition</u> issued a new report calling on the New York State Education Department to advance *universal access to media literacy education* for all New York students. The report presents a plan to help guide state education officials in taking immediate action to ensure New York does not continue to fall behind other states that have already taken steps to ensure their students

become media literate.

In today's world, media literacy is a necessity and must be part of the pathway to a high school diploma. Young people engage with screen media for many hours each day, and media messages influence nearly every aspect of their lives. Media literacy encompasses the knowledge and skills students need to think critically and make responsible decisions about the media they consume, create, and share. 


